Project title:	Australian Fantasy Fiction in Japan
Project duration, hours of engagement & delivery mode	 4 weeks during Winter Vacation (at 28hrs per week) and 1 day a week during semester 2, 2022. Some on-site attendance is required if circumstances permit. However, most of the project can be completed remotely.
Description:	This Winter Research project forms part of a larger research project on Australian and Japanese fantasy genres of literature and popular culture (manga, anime, film, fashion, etc). This part of the project continues an investigation into which Australian works of fantasy fiction have been translated into Japanese, and how these works are visually presented, promoted, and received in Japan.
	The Winter Research project will culminate in an exhibition, which forms part of a series of events, the Festival of the Fantastic in Australian and Japanese Arts. The aim of these events is to promote scholarly, creative, and fan community connections between Australia and Japan in the realm of the fantastic arts, and to analyse and promote the uptake of Australian fantasy works in Japan.
	These events are free and open to the public, and will be available in both English and Japanese, both online and in person. Encouraging participation for all in the arts is a priority of this project.
Expected outcomes and deliverables:	The main output of the Winter research project will be a digital exhibition of Japanese translations of Australian fantasy fiction. This will be displayed both online (on a well established literature website) and physically on large screens in a public place as part of a larger exhibition.

	 The student will be encouraged to: co-write an accompanying research essay on the topic, mentored by experienced co-authors
