Nomination Requirements	Student nominations by partner institutions are accepted in the following mandatory format. - Full name (as written on passport) - Date of Birth (month/day/year format. Example: April 12, 1998 is 4/12/1998) - Personal email address - Academic department - Duration (Fall Semester, Spring Semester, Academic Year, or Calendar Year)
Nomination Deadlines	Fall Semester: February 15 Spring Semester: September 15
Nomination Procedure	To nominate a student, please fill out the Nomination Form found here. Once the student is nominated, they will be given access to the UMass Abroad application by email.

Application Procedure	Application materials must be submitted through the online portal. Students who are successfully nominated will be given details on how to apply.	

	APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS
Transcript(s)	Official transcript(s) of all completed courses as well as a list of current courses. Note on Grades: Students are required to submit an explanation that addresses grades falling below a letter grade of B by US standards. Reasons could be specific personal circumstances or an explanation of the distribution of grades at home university. Grades could also be addressed in letters of recommendation.
Study Proposal	In the study proposal, graduate students must provide detailed information on their academic background and achievements AND articulate how their time at UMass will help them achieve their academic and career goals. Therefore, the study proposal should mention specific UMass courses of interest, relevant courses taken at their home university, research and/or specific lab work they might be interested in, and internships or other work experiences that are related to their field of study. Students must choose a specific academic department at UMass to which they will direct their application. The study proposal should be two pages double-spaced and the main emphasis should be on academics and why a semester or year in a specific department at UMass Amherst will be beneficial. For applications to more than one department, students must submit a for each one. One or two courses listed in the study proposal can be selected from outside departments. To find courses, students must use search the course catalogue for the previous fall or spring semester. Do not reference the department websites. See the Study Proposal Guidelines for more information.
Letters of Recommendation	Students need two (2) letters of reference from sources who know the student in an academic setting and will be able to rank their academic achievements.
Financial Documentation	Current bank statement(s) are required from either the student, financial sponsor, or both, along with the <u>financial sponsor form</u> , if applicable. Bank statements must be dated within the last 6 months.
CV/Resume	Students must upload a copy of their most recent Curriculum Vitae (CV)
English Language Proficiency, if applicable	•Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL): minimum score of 80* •International English Language Testing System (IELTS): minimum score of 6.5 •Pearson Test of English (PTE Academic): minimum overall score of 53 •Duolingo English Test: minimum overall score of 105 •Native English Speakers: Note from home institution stating language abilities. *Please note, when reviewing an application we does not superscore language tests (e.g. we do not accept the ETS MyBest Score set). Some departments require higher scores.

EXCHANGE EXPENSE ESTIMATES

COURSE INFORMATION

At UMass Amherst, students register for courses using our Internet-based registration system, known as SPIRE. Course schedule information is ONLY available online. Students will need their NetID and password to log in to SPIRE. (The NetID and password are the same codes used to access their UMass email account.)

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Course Catalog	Students can browse course offerings by semester without a UMass NetID by visiting www.spire.umass.edu and clicking "Search Classes/Catalog" under the heading Catalogs & Schedules. Course Registration Guidelines can be found here .
Course Access	No courses are guaranteed. Often, the same classes or similar ones will be offered each year, but sometimes during only one term, e.g., fall or spring. Since the course catalog for future semesters are not online yet, you will need to look at the current as well as previous semesters to see if the course may be offered.
Course and Program Restrictions	There are a limited number of exchanges spaces within many UMass departments. Some departments may accept applications on a first-come, first-served basis, while others may use other criteria for approving candidates. Clinical Psychology does not accept exchange students. Online courses are not covered by exchange agreements.
Language of Instruction	English (unless a specific language course)
Registration Period	Students will receive an email with registration dates and information. Students are encouraged to familiarize themselves with SPIRE and have a variety of courses in mind so they can enroll as soon as their enrollment appointment begins. The first two weeks of each semester is called the "Add/Drop" period where students can freely add classes or drop out of classes without any record.
Course Number System	100-199 – Lower Division Undergraduate – Freshman (first year) level 200-299 – Lower Division Undergraduate – Sophomore (second year) level 300-399 - Upper Division Undergraduate – Junior (third year) level 400-499 - Upper Division Undergraduate – Senior (fourth year) level IMPORTANT: Graduate students are expected to take at least two 500 level or above courses per semester and no more than one undergraduate course per semester. 500 - 599 Combined graduate/undergraduate 600 - 699 Master's or first-year graduate 700 - 899 Doctoral or advanced graduate
Course Types	Courses will generally be lecture style though some lectures are accompanied with a separate discussion section or lab. Other types of classes are seminars or independent studies with professors (contact professor for information).
Course Load	Graduate exchange students must enroll in a minimum of 9 credits per semester. 6 credits must be 500+ level.

GRADING SYSTEM

UMass uses a typical American grade point average (GPA) system. The percentages corresponding to each letter grade vary depending on the professor and the department, but are generally stated in the syllabus.

SPIRE HELP

SPIRE is the University's secure online student information system. Almost all student functions take place on SPIRE: Students use SPIRE to register for courses, view/pay their Bursar bill, view holds, select/view housing assignments, change meal plans, etc. You will need your Net ID and password to log in to SPIRE (the Net ID and password are the same codes that they use to access their UMass email account).

ACQUIRING A VISA

Students who are not US citizens or Green Card holders are required to obtain the proper visa or immigration status for study in the US, as well as pay the I-901 SEVIS Fee (approximately \$220) and the visa application processing fee (approximately \$160), both of which are not listed on the budget sheet.

As part of the UMass Amherst Exchange application, students are required to provide proof of funds sufficient to cover program and living expenses while in the US. In addition, students are required to upload a scanned copy of their passport. This information will be used to create the necessary forms needed to produce the DS-2019 form.

Acceptance letters and DS-2019 Certificate of Eligibility forms will be mailed to the address provided on the student application. Once the student receives the paperwork, they can pay the fees and make a visa appointment at their local embassy or consulate. Information on how to apply for a visa will be emailed to the student upon acceptance into the program.

	HEALTH AND SAFETY
Student Health Insurance	The U.S. Federal and Massachusetts State governments require that all J-1 visa holders have health coverage. In compliance with Massachusetts insurance requirements, students will automatically be enrolled in the Student Health Plan (SHBP) in order to meet the State's insurance requirements and are not eligible to waive any part of the SHBP.
	Graduate students who are eligible for health fee exemptions through an assistantship in the GEO bargaining unit are only responsible for 5% of the cost of individual SHBP and 10% of the family plan.
Insurance for Families	Students who will be accompanied by their families will need to purchase the Student Family Health Insurance Plan.
Health Fee	In addition to the SHBP, students pay a mandatory Student Health Fee that entitles them to be seen at University Health Services. This fee cannot be waived.
Immunizations	State law requires that college students have certain immunizations before coming to school.

Health Services	<u>University Health Services</u> (UHS) provides a large range of medical services on-campus for UMass community members including but not limited to: regular appointments, pharmacy, walk-in clinics, and women's health services.

Academic Support	UMass has multiple libraries, study spaces, tutoring centers, and technology resources available for students to use. Most notably, the Dubois Library stands 28 stories tall as a campus landmark.
Employment Options	For employment options for J-1 students please visit the <u>IPO J-1 website</u> .
IT and Wi-Fi	The IT office is available to answer questions concerning technology needs. There is Wi-Fi access and a large number of available computer stations all over campus.
Public Transportation	The PVTA provides FREE public transportation in and around the Amherst area.
Student Organizations	UMass is home to over 500 student organizations that students can join through <u>Campus PULSE</u> .
Sports and Recreation	UMass is home to sports teams including football, basketball, and hockey. There are official university teams where students can buy tickets and attend games. There are also intramural teams that anyone can join. For more information, visit the Campus Recreation website .

Accommodations	Currently there is NO available graduate housing on-campus. All graduate students, including international graduate students, are expected to find accommodations in the community. The IPO recommends that students research housing within walking distance to a PVTA bus route. PVTA buses are free for UMass students while classes are in session.
