## Presentation Abstracts

### **Session A**

I am seen; hence, I belong. Developing sense of belonging through theatre, Spanish and SSP Alicia Gazmuri Sanhueza, Franciele Spinelli, Ray Shindo, Ruth-Sara Sanchez Asun

"We are driven by five genetic needs: survival, love and belonging, power, freedom, and fun" (Glasser, 1998). Considering belonging as a basic human motivation (Maslow, 1962) and one of the UQ strategic priorities, the Spanish Theatre Project *SomoS*, developed during semester 1 2022 as a SSP Project at SLAS Program (School of Languages and Cultures), originates as an innovative theatrical and cross-cultural extracurricular initiative for UQ Spanish students to develop, among other skills, a sense of belonging by their identities being "accepted, valued, included, and encouraged by others" (Goodenow, 1993) before, during and after the project. Consisting of three plays' rehearsals by 9 volunteer students and the co-coordination of both the project and the performance event by 4 Student and 4 Staff Partners, *SomoS* is a community space that makes students feel safe, valued, visible, connected to the campus and proud of being UQ students undertaking a Spanish course.

## Nurturing a sense of belonging to support Equity, Diversity and Inclusion at UQ Amy Hickman, Elizabeth Ambrose, Megan Porter

For our EDI Unconference codesign, our cross disciplinary student partnership team included partners from Public health, psychological sciences, and writing and communication. Over time it became clear that vulnerability was central to a sense of belonging and inclusion in our own experience as SS partners. It took courage to be vulnerable with each other, to be honest and open and to play to each other's strengths. Through this process we saw how important vulnerability is to EDI. We had the courage not to hide our disabilities so we can be seen and included for who we are. This visibility strengthens community and partnership. Thus, our theme for the Unconference was born: Exploring Vulnerability though Courage, Compassion, and Connection. Our commitment to vulnerability allowed for honest conversations to happen in the Unconference itself, which forged community engagement and support for critical change.

### Integrating student perspectives in developing a new planning studio: Northshore Hamilton case study Isabella Foreman, Kruti Soni, Sebastien Darchen

We are reflecting about our experiences as teacher / student during the development of a new planning studio on the Northshore Hamilton regeneration area. From my perspective as a teacher, I have been impressed by the innovative inputs from both students. Isabella and Kruti provided insightful suggestions to make the practicals more engaging and the assignments more relevant. They also confirmed some of my assumptions about the choice of the site. The main take-away as a teacher is the teaching innovation that can be generated from such a partnership especially for a practical subject such as planning. As a student planner, OOPS Industry Representative and current BRTP student, I have contributed with my perspective as a young professional and student to provide feedback and aid in developing a course that integrates planning practice for the Brisbane 2032 Olympics and engage industry professionals to provide insight to students.

### Different together: making change that resonates across communities Alex Crook, Brooke Szucs, José Escobar Lema, Pabina Gotame, Sam Marcel

Despite the importance of the employability and personal development that arises from participation in extracurricular activities, they are often not included in Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion efforts. Our Student Staff Partnership aimed to change this, and we will present a few of our suggestions. We will also discuss the value of bringing together a diverse team with very different backgrounds and experiences to improve these employability outcomes for our communities, especially with an intersectional lens.

# The power of teamwork: an uplifting experience of digital learning resources enhancement Alicia Gazmuri Sanhueza, Annita Stell, Claudia Vasquez Fernandez, Dongchen Yao, Franciele Spinelli, Noriko Iwashita, Qingmiao Cheng, Takeshi Onodera, Yifeng Cheng

We believe that collaboration between staff and student partners is a key element to revitalizing the curriculum of any course. Reflecting on this journey, we have learned and grown individually and as a team through enhancing communication and collaboration toward successfully achieving our aim. Admittedly, the best part of it was experiencing the power of teamwork.

### Change for good: a greener campus one team at a time Ho Tin Ng, Hoy Ning Kimberly Luk, Laura Wilson

This SSP brings together three students whose academic studies are focussed on sustainability, with three members of the Advancement and Community Engagement (ACE) team. Change for good - A Greener campus one team at a time set out to identify measures that the ACE team could take to make their work more sustainable. So far, it has provided opportunities for us to connect with a number of different areas at UQ including the Sustainability Office and Property and Facilities, as we have identified the steps needed to creating change in such a large and complex organisational environment. We have all learned a lot about the diversity of people's work and the numerous sustainability initiatives already in place at UQ, and the staff have learned a lot about sustainability from Kim, Dennis and Laura already. We are excited about the potential for this project to contribute to greater sustainability across UQ.

### **Session B**

### Co-creating a Student Experience Action Plan in the School of Nursing, Midwifery and Social Work Debby Lynch, Janine Rix, Tingting Yang

Welcome to our Student-Staff Partnership (SSP) Project presentation! We began our SSP Project as a group of individuals and we are here to share the story of how we developed into a dynamic, fun-loving and highly dedicated project team. The aim of our SSP Project was to co-create a 'Student Experience Action Plan' (SAP) in the School of Nursing, Midwifery and Social Work (NMSW). Our project brought 4 student partners, one from each discipline of Nursing, Midwifery, Social Work and Counselling and 2 staff members together to respond to the challenge of forging new pathways for connection to enhance student engagement and foster a sense of belonging in NMSW following the COVID pandemic. Now, we explore (and reflect on) our partnership through three illuminating lenses: connection, spark, and spotlight.

### FutureWorkx: the making of a MOOC Annisa Cahyani, Shuwenjun (Winnie) Ma, Tin Nguyen, Zezheng (Kevin) Shi

As students, our team had little experience and knowledge of the working world. Whenever we tried preparing ourselves, we did so with minimal grace. Picture yourself walking through the woods at night without a flashlight – that was us. We did not know what to do, we just tried to figure things out along the way. This presentation will focus on our 'spark' – a lightbulb moment that was made possible through our SSP project. In this project, student partners collaborate with UQ staff to develop a MOOC, titled FutureWorkx, for a UQx-edX collaboration. This partnership shed light on the resources we needed to navigate the uncertainty of joining the workforce. Now, not only do we know more of the steps involved, we also have learned a lot about communicating those steps to others by first-hand participation in the building of this FutureWorkx MOOC.

### Profit from the price chart: exposing students to real-life stock trading Ashil Ranpara, Chun Hei So, Emily Hoang, Jennifer Sun, Masrur Alam

Technical analysis is an essential skill for students who are interested in being a trader at some stage in their career or simply interested in trading stocks. This SSP project aims to have a student partner-centred approach to create an optional-curriculum module to introduce technical analysis. The module aims to enrich students' experience working with real-life data, improve their skillset, and potentially boost their employability. The module also aims to provide students with a safer environment to practice their trading skills before moving into the workforce.

### Digital resource repository to support UQ Pre-service Teachers learning through practice Kirsten Fairbairn, Lachlan Miller, Melanie Harper

Our SSP project aims to provide a unified accessible resource repository for pre-service teaching students across all programs and year levels to improve student confidence and competence on professional experience placements. In the form of a blackboard page, the repository features resources collated with staff guidance and targeting student-identified needs, including lesson planners, videos to practice observation, and locally developed resources. Throughout the project, we have collaborated with students and staff across the School of Education and the greater UQ community to identify and strategically develop essential elements of the repository. It was built by students trained in UQ-based learning platforms including Blackboard and H5P, with the goal of making the depository as integrated and easy to use as possible. Going forward, our SSP team will open it up for self-enrolment, gain feedback from students and staff, and continue to grow its resources.

## Dentistry partnerships: mapping our way back to campus together Gabii Starr, Sowmya Shetty, Tachae Douglas-Miller

Recent student-staff partnership initiatives at the school highlight the value of student community engagement to support growth for all stakeholders. Tangible outcomes in the teaching and learning space and student experience have only been possible from partnerships that are designing UQ specific resources in both spaces. We aim to showcase our experience of forming and strengthening working student-staff partnerships at Dentistry. We have been able to foster a sense of belonging and spark interest and enthusiasm, for on campus teaching as well as social activities this year. The revival of the student experience committee, with student leadership along with successful and meaningful partnerships has meant more collaborative planning and implementation of Dentistry projects this year.

#### Fun, friendly and informal: learning with online study buddies Ben Cossalter

Studying online, particularly in an open online course that has no cohorts, can be an isolating experience. Moving beyond peer assessment and discussion boards, this presentation will look at how pre-recorded study sessions with real students are being used to help learners feel more connected as they progress through an online course, while having content reviewed in a fun and entertaining way.
