Report purpose

This report aims for student reps to reflect upon and share their experience of participating in the *Young Professionals' Forum*, part of the 2019 Asia Pacific Cities Summit, with the wider UQ student rep community. Reflection and Lessons Learned

• What were some of the highlights of your experience? (min. 150 words)

The highlights of my experience were meeting a number of motivated young people who were apart of the Young Professionals Forum and the keynote speaker sessions. Throughout the conference, the workshops run as part of the Young Professionals' Forum allowed us to connect and get to know other delegates. This was fantastic because I was able to learn so much from the people I was surrounded by and now have connections in many industries over Brisbane. It also made the challenges proposed to us during the workshops enjoyable and engaging. The keynote sessions had a number of inspiring speakers who were thought provoking. They each brought a different perspective to the future of cities and stemmed thinking around solutions to our current obstacles. In particular, I enjoyed Peggy Liu who showed a part of China's sustainability planning and movements. Before Peggy's session, I was unaware of the significant steps China has taken to improve sustainability and livelihoods in their cities for the future. She also highlighted the need for education around food and agriculture from as early as kindergarten as well as a program she has set up as part of this initiative.

• What were some of the key lessons you learned from your participation in this forum involving city / business leaders and young professionals from across the Asia Pacific region and beyond? [e.g. This may include outlining some of the opportunities or challenges and how you overcame these obstacles] (min. 150 words)

Some of the key lessons I learnt came from the sub-sectors of the conference in relation to the mobility of cities and innovation of cities. The mobility of cities session highlighted the importance of smart cities through using digital IT to integrate various transport systems. Throughout this session, another important conversation was on the topic of the rise of active transport and hyper-mobility and hence a need for a focus on E-transport and more investment in technologies such as public scooters and bikes. In terms of innovation of cities, I learnt about how to create change in inflexible cities and organisations by looking at problems in two different ways. This involved a philosophy presented by Marc Randolph where he explained how challenges can be seen as a one-way or two-way door. In this situation, a one-way door refers to a problem where a risk taken for resolution or innovation is irreversible. On the other hand, in a two-way problem, there is a potential to rectify any issues that may arise from taking a risk. Overall, this really demonstrated the need to take risks for innovation and the capacity to take a risk in certain situations and how to evaluate whether the risk is justifiable.

• How do you propose to share your experiences and learnings from the forum with your UQ student cohort as a student representative? (min. 150 words)

I have been and will continue to share my experiences and learnings from the forum through various avenues. Firstly, professional social media platforms has been a great way to represent my experience throughout and after the conference. On top of this, through posting about the conference I have been able to highlight not only the interesting things we were able to do but also the conversations and discussions that took place. In addition to social media platforms, I will share my experiences and learnings through word of mouth with my colleagues. I find that living in a UQ halls of residence, sharing these experiences in meetings and with the surrounding students is a great way to spread my message from the forum. Finally, I will weave my experiences and learnings into group discussions during future lectures, presentations and group assignments as well as harnessing the club that I am on the executive committee to promote the forum and sponsorship of UQ.

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Reflection and Lessons Learned

• What were some of the highlights of your experience? (min. 150 words)

• What were some of the key lessons you learned from your participation in this forum involving city / business leaders and young professionals from across the Asia Pacific region and beyond? One of the key lessons I learnt was that you are never too young to achieve something remarkable. At this forum I had the privilege of meeting many great young minds. A challenge I had to overcome was being able to articulate my ideas in the midst of other people's opinions. During the workshop, I initially had trouble presenting my ideas because everyone was so eager to present their own. Never have I seen a table full of young people who all want to present their ideas – I was more accustomed to few people who take the lead and if anything, the remainder usually requires prompting but this was not the case at the Young Professionals' Forum. However, I learned to bide my time and made sure that all my points were concise and organised so that communication is effective and efficient, while ensuring that other people also had the chance to express their views.

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Reflection and Lessons Learned

• What were some of the highlights of your experience? (min. 150 words)

The 2019 Asia Pacific Cities Summit was one of the best-organised conferences I've attended throughout my career as a researcher, with some of the best line-ups of speakers representing leaders from politics, industry, academia and others. We got to hear from the likes of Marc Randolph (co-founder of Netflix), Andreas Weigend (former Chief Scientist of Amazon), Peggy Liu (chairperson of the Joint US China Collaboration on Clean Energy), Colin Tooze (director of public affairs at Uber), Arlian Ecker the plastic free boy, various Lord Mayors of Australian capital cities, and our very own vice-chancellor Peter Høj!

At the Young Professionals' Forum, we got to wrestle with some of the issues city leaders face every day. As a cohort, we examined challenges facing the innovation, mobility, liveability and sustainability of cities, and brainstormed ideas with future and emerging leaders from various disciplines.

We had some amazing food and entertainment throughout the forum. We saw the Australian Girls Choir sing and some fireworks displays at the Howard Smith Wharves with the magnificent Story Bridge as the backdrop during the opening ceremony welcome reception, enjoyed a surprise performance by the internationally-renowned The Three Waiters at the Mayors' and Young Professionals' dinner in the Brisbane City Hall, had live jazz performance at the Gala Dinner and even watched a performance by piano prodigy Samuel Choi for the closing ceremony.

Not to mention all the awesome volunteers too! They were a cohort of 135 professionals themselves that went through a stringent selection (there were more than 600 applicants), ranging from aviation students to university professors. They went through weeks of training under the guidance of Dr. Michelle Lee of the Royal Brisbane Institute of Technology (RBIT), and it is amazing to see the passion of these people serving the Brisbane city with honour.

 What were some of the key lessons you learned from your participation in this forum involving city / business leaders and young professionals from across the Asia Pacific region **and beyond?** [e.g. This may include outlining some of the opportunities or challenges and how you overcame these obstacles] *(min. 150 words)*

This forum gave me a deeper insight into how cities operate, and how they do not just aim to be functional but also to provide a sense of pride and attachment to their inhabitants. It reminded me of the many services that city governments provide (more than often taken for granted) and revealed the difficulties encountered by various stakeholders to ensure that these services are of the best quality.

Some of the key lessons I learnt included:

- o Principles that underpin successful innovative start-ups
- o Aspects to consider during town planning and urban development
- Realisation that factors improving the efficacy and efficiency of cities does not translate into a love for the city by its people
- o Insights on decision making that will have broadscale and/or multi-generational impact

Perhaps the most unexpected gain from the conference was watching the Master of Ceremony, Toby Travanner, host the event and chair forum panels. That sure helped me prepare for being the MC at my friend's wedding later this year!

• How do you propose to share your experiences and learnings from the forum with your UQ student cohort as a student representative? (min. 150 words)

First and foremost, I will be bringing the perspectives gained through this forum into my future conversations, both official discussions or casual chats. I hope I will be able to integrate a more comprehensive point of view when serving on the various committees and student representative roles, offering constructive ideas whenever possible.

I will continue to emphasise the value of networking with my peers, in every opportunity available prompt them to do so, creating the platforms for them, or even to help initiate the conversation if they lack the courage and confidence approaching strangers. I will also share the contacts I met at the conference with friends who may need the connection.

Last but not least, I will actively encourage my cohort to participate in 2021APCS (Denpasar, Bali) and/or 2023APCS (Brisbane, Australia), regardless as a Young Professionals' Forum delegate, a full delegate, or even as a volunteer! 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Reflection and Lessons Learned

• What were some of the highlights of your experience? (min. 150 words)

This event significantly exceeded my expectations! It all started with our orientation session when we were reminded of the importance of finding our own voice, our own identity. And who could have guessed that we would be doing it through... singing! exercises. Such a simple strategy set the tone for the rest of this event – a tone of thinking outside of the box, being open-minded and creative. I had the privilege to join conversations about innovation, mobility, liveability and sustainability of cities and network with key influencers of cities from the Asia-Pacific region. The event was very enriching and well balanced – with many points of listening and absorbing information, which allowed reflection, but then also brainstorming and presenting back the ideas, which could contribute to the conversation. I applaud to my fellow young professionals (all 170 of them) who made this experience so enjoyable and rewarding. Working together, it reminded me how powerful and empowering a group of vibrant, bright and curious young talents could be, when their energies are synergised and put towards solving problems (even the most challenging ones!). I was also impressed with the seamless flow of the whole event. It was very well organised and to my surprise, quite a few of my own students were volunteering at this event (which made me very proud!).



• What were some of the key lessons you learned from your participation in this forum involving city / business leaders and young professionals from across the Asia Pacific region and beyond? [e.g. This may include outlining some of the opportunities or challenges and how you overcame these obstacles] (min. 150 words)

Lessons can take various shapes and forms. From a knowledge perspective, the two standout keynote speakers were Marc Randolph (the co-founder of Netflix) and Andreas Weigend (the former chief scientist of Amazon). Both made a significant imprint on the audience, and me personally. Among many thought-provoking insights and take-aways, a few powerful quotes particularly stuck with me: "the idea does not have to be big, original or even good – it's about trying lots of bad ideas" and "Do not start with the idea – look first at the pain, or problem!".

In terms of my attitude, it's easy to be pessimistic and even cynical when we start looking closely into the mobility, liveability, sustainability (in particular) and innovation of the cities. However, this event was a great reminder and a showcase that with challenges come opportunities. And staying optimistic O is critical to enable any change! In fact, Brisbane in particular, has a lot to be proud of in terms of the ongoing and planned city initiatives towards more prosperous and sustainable future.

I also gained a feeling of empowerment to help overcome some of the challenges. At first, I was a bit intimidated and sceptical of my ability to effectively network with all the Lord Mayors, Councillors and other government representatives. However, to my great surprise, I felt very comfortable throughout the whole event and they all made it easy and enjoyable – and were very humble and approachable. Although admittedly, I might have accidentally touched on a few rather sensitive topics, but it's only practice that makes perfect. (And of course, I can always play my "I'm Russian" card if needed).

• How do you propose to share your experiences and learnings from the forum with your UQ student cohort as a student representative? (min. 150 words)

This forum has reinforced and reminded me about the importance of individual responsibility in shaping our own behaviours and behaviours of others in response to the grand challenges and problems facing our present and nearest future. In fact, it was a 13 year old boy, also known as a 'Plastic free boy', who reminded us all about the power of each individual and their actions and the great impact and ripple effect these may have (he became an internet sensation with his movie on plastic pollution and influenced over 100,000 school kids). So, living his legacy, it's important to share the insights and ideas which we gain in the events like this one and use various networks available to us (at the University and outside), as well as the power of social media, and proactively reach out to as many people as possible. Holding roundtables, talking at lunches, spreading the word and encouraging awareness and care amongst others whenever and wherever possible – but it all ultimately starts with us each taking action.
